reassurance. It takes no effort on our part, and it offers so much to those we love.

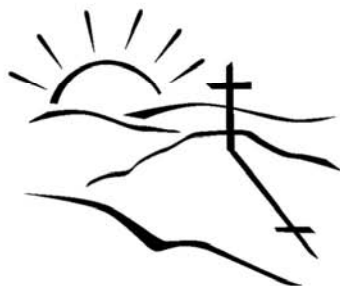

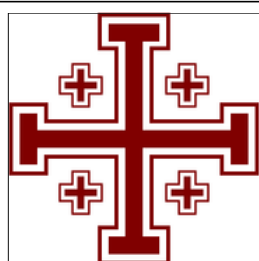

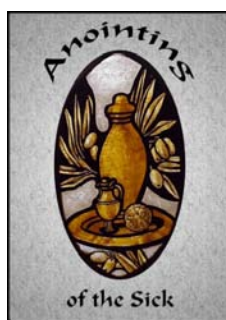

The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick:

In the Letter of St. James we find the question: "Are there any among you who are sick?" St. James advises what should be done, namely, that "they should call for the priests of the Church and have them pray over the sick anointing them with

oil in the name of the Lord." This Anointing formerly called "Extreme Unction" or "The Last Rites," is not only intended for those near death but is for all the sick. We encourage you to request this sacrament when facing illness, prior to surgery or medical tests. Allow the Lord to come and comfort you and the prayer of the Church to strengthen you. This sacrament is a powerful sign of the love of God and the healing grace of Jesus.

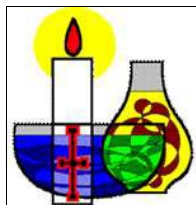

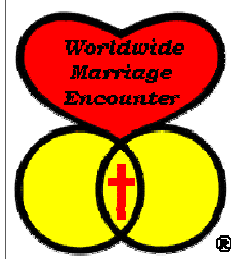

Seeing and Believing

Jesus is nowhere visible. Yet today's Gospel tells us that Peter and John "saw and believed." What did they see? Burial shrouds lying on the floor of an empty tomb. Maybe that convinced them that He hadn't been carted off by grave robbers, who usually stole the expensive burial linens and left the corpses behind. But notice the repetition of the word "tomb" - seven times in nine verses. They saw the empty tomb and they believed what He had promised: that God would raise Him on the third day. Chosen to be His "witnesses," today's First Reading tells us, the Apostles were "commissioned...to preach...and testify" to all that they had seen - from His anointing with the Holy Spirit at the Jordan to the empty tomb. More than their own experience, they were instructed in the mysteries of the divine economy, God's saving plan - to know how "all the prophets bear witness" to Him (see Luke 24:27,44). Now they could "understand the Scripture," could teach us what He had told them - that He was "the Stone which the builders rejected," that today's Psalm prophesies His Resurrection and exaltation (see Luke 20:17; Matthew 21:42; Acts 4:11). We are the children of the apostolic witnesses. That is why we still gather early in the morning on the first day of every week to celebrate this feast of the empty tomb, give thanks for "Christ our life," as today's Epistle calls Him. Baptized into His death and Resurrection, we live the heavenly life of the risen Christ, our lives "hidden with Christ in God." We are now His witnesses, too. But we testify to things we cannot see but only believe; we seek in earthly things what is above. We live in memory of the Apostles' witness, like them eating and drinking with the risen Lord at the altar. And we wait in hope for what the Apostles told us would come - the day when we too "will appear with Him in glory."

A Report from Your Pastoral Planning Committee

For the past year, there has been a committee quietly at work within our community. The committee is made up of our pastors, the staffs of both parishes, and both parishes' Pastoral and Finance Councils. Our task is to prepare for the very likely possibility that someday, maybe soon, our Catholic community will be served by one priest. Why did our pastors ask us to form this committee? What factors are at work to make this scenario likely? And how can we continue to fulfill our mission as the Body of Christ in Saugus if this situation does occur?

First, a bit of background: we all know that Mass attendance is down. Here in Saugus, in 2006, total weekly Mass attendance from our two parishes averaged 1,572. For 2008, that number dropped to 1,362 and the average dropped again in 2009 to 1,222. However, we are losing priests at a much faster rate. In 2003, there were 876 priests serving 357 parishes in the Archdiocese of Boston. In 2006, we had 798 priests and 295 parishes. Right now, there are 349 priests available to serve in our 290 parishes. Ten years from now, we will have 166 priests available for parish assignments. The Archdiocese has raised the retirement age for priests, but there are too few men being ordained to maintain the current staffing levels in our parishes. Today, the average parish priest in our Archdiocese works between sixty-five and seventy hours per week. For the health of our priests, we need to find a solution.

Our committee has been operating in the background until now, working to identify the specific issues and needs that will arise if we find ourselves with one priest for our people. We believe that phase of our task is completed, that we have a good sense of what the impact will be if we lose one priest from our parishes. We are now moving into the second part of our assignment, assessing potential solutions to specific needs, exploring ways to staff our ministries, and ensuring that our parishes will continue to provide a vibrant, healthy experience of the Catholic way of life.

Look for frequent reports in future bulletins of what the committee is working on, and how we can all work together to fulfill our Catholic mission here in Saugus.

From the Pastoral Planning Committee, a joint committee of Blessed Sacrament and St. Margaret's parishes, formed to prepare for the day when there may be one priest serving the Catholic community of Saugus.

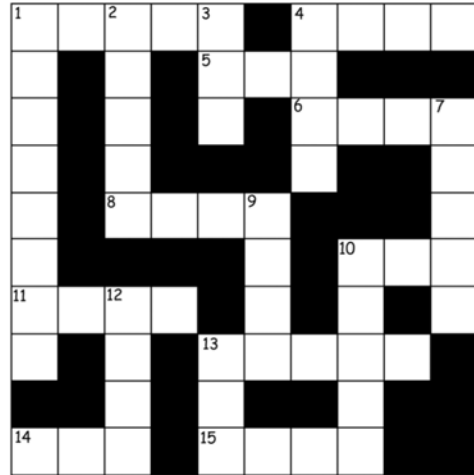

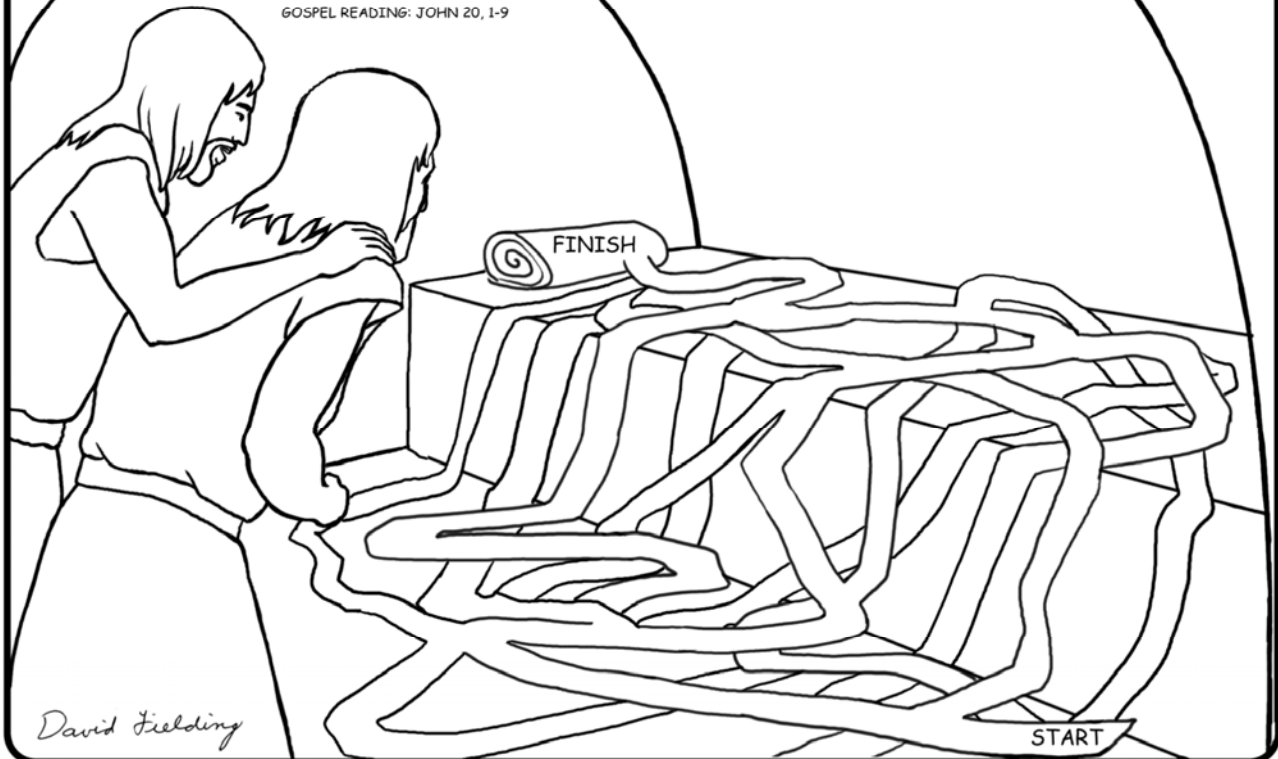
