In Word & Deed

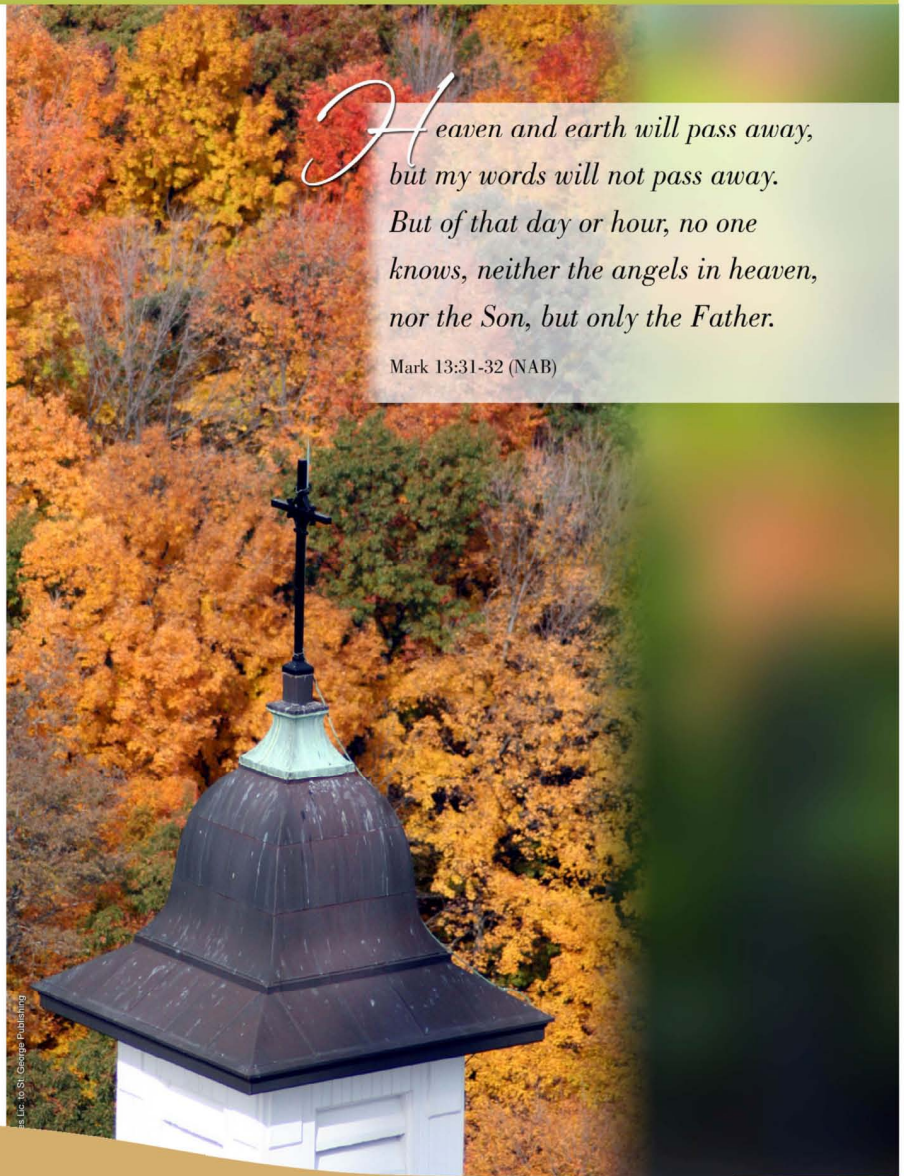
In a homily about the afterlife, the pastor spoke about the doubts he had when, as a young man, he was trying to figure out the mysteries of God and whether or not heaven really existed. His doubts all but vanished when he attended the viewing of his friend's father. As everyone turned to leave, the wife of the man kissed him and said with great conviction and certainty, "Bye for now." Something in her voice and in her tone answered his questions and doubts, assuring him of God's existence and love. That small witness to faith changed his life.

In this Gospel, the images that Jesus uses are prophetic images that point to the end of time and the coming of the Lord. We are not told to look for the signs, but rather to have a sense of urgency about what we do and how we live. When it is

TO WALK AS ONE

A high school service project at the local soup kitchen included driving through the neighborhood and offering food and drink to the homeless. One man was very grateful for a bottle of water and he told his young benefactor that the water saved his life. He was not kidding. The heat had taken its toll on everyone and he had not had any water for at least a day.

It was a valuable lesson. We take water so much for granted that we easily overlook its power to cleanse, heal, and renew life. It is more than a luxury; it is essential for life. Without it, we get sick, we suffer, and we die. Without water, we cannot be clean and we cannot be refreshed. No wonder it

is such a powerful symbol of God's grace.

God's grace cleanses, heals and renews us. We carry that grace to one another. Like the student who offers the homeless man a bottle of water, we share grace with each other. Every day we have the opportunity to be renewed by the love of family and friends and to offer the same gift. Kindness, generosity, patience and understanding heal, renew and refresh us. These are the virtues that make family life possible and make it all that it can be.

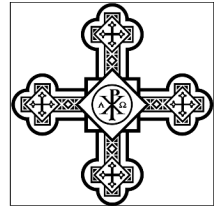

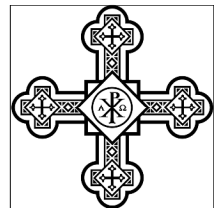

Blessed Sacrament Religious Education:

Grade 1 through 6: Classes meet this week from 10:15 a.m. to 11:15 a.m. at Saugus High School. All students are reminded to bring their donations for the St. Stephen Ministry Thanksgiving Food Drive. *Thank you!*

Blessed Sacrament Parish CORIs: It is that time of the year when we have to ask that all church volunteers submit a new Cori form for 2009-2010. Volunteers can fill out a form in the sacristy prior to any Mass or come to the rectory Monday-Friday 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. **A current driver's license or state-issued ID is needed for verification.** Members of the following ministries are impacted: Eucharistic Ministers, lectors, Usher, Cantors and Musicians, St. Stephen Ministry, St. Vincent de Paul, Catholic Women's Guild members that volunteer at any time in the church. Only one Cori form is required of each person; therefore, if you have already submitted a form within the past few months, another one is not needed. Speak to Fr. Dan for any questions.

The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick: In the Letter of Saint James we find an important question: "Are there any among you who are sick?" Saint James also advises what should be done, namely, that "they should call for the priests of the Church and have them pray over the sick anointing them with oil in the name of the Lord." This Anointing formerly called "Extreme Unction" or "The Last Rites," is not only intended for those near death but is for all the sick. We encourage you to request this sacrament when facing illness, prior to surgery or medical tests. Allow the Lord to come and comfort you and the prayer of the Church to strengthen you.

Swine Flu Precautions: • The Holy Water fonts are to be drained, cleaned with a disinfecting soap, and re-filled with holy water on a regular basis. • The distribution of the Precious Blood for the faithful is suspended, with the exception of those who must receive from the cup due to medical reasons. The faith of the Church teaches that Christ, whole and entire, is received even under only one species. • The exchange of the Sign of Peace is to be offered without any physical contact. The faithful, instead of a handshake, may bow to the persons nearby. • While the faithful retain the option of receiving Holy Communion on the tongue or in the hand, all ministers of Holy Communion are advised to distribute the consecrated hosts with care, being cautious not to touch the tongue or the hand of the communicant. • Parishioners should be reminded that if they are ill or suspect they are ill with a contagious illness, they are not bound by the Sunday Mass obligation. They should remain at home and return to church when they are well.

Catholic High School Placement Testing: Grade 8 students who plan on attending a Catholic High School next year (Fall of 2010) must take the Catholic High School Placement Test. The dates of the test are November 14 and December 12. Call your local Catholic High School for more information and to register.

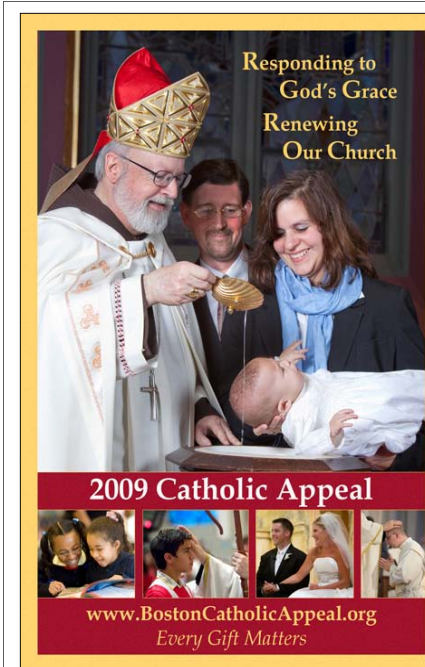

Hope in Tribulation

33rd Sunday in Ordinary Time

In this, the second-to-the-last week of the Church year, Jesus has finally made it to Jerusalem. Near to His passion and death, He gives us a teaching of hope—telling us how it will be when He returns again in glory. Today’s Gospel is taken from the end of a long discourse in which He describes tribulations the likes of which haven’t been seen “since the beginning of God’s creation” (see Mark 13:9). He describes what amounts to a dissolution of God’s creation, a “devolution” of the world to its original state of formlessness and void. First, human community—nations and kingdoms—will break down (see Mark 13:7-8). Then the earth will stop yielding food and begin to shake apart (13:8). Next, the family will be torn apart from within and the last faithful individuals will be persecuted (13:9-13). Finally, the Temple will be desecrated, the earth emptied of God’s presence (13:14). In today’s reading, God is described putting out the lights that He established in the sky in the very beginning—the sun, the moon and the stars (see also Isaiah 13:10; 34:4). Into this “uncreated” darkness, the Son of Man, in Whom all things were made, will come. Jesus has already told us that the Son of Man must be humiliated and killed (see Mark 8:31). Here He describes His ultimate victory, using royal-divine images drawn from the Old Testament—clouds, glory, and angels (see Daniel 7:13). He shows Himself to be the fulfillment of all God’s promises to save “the elect,” the faithful remnant (see Isaiah 43:6; Jeremiah 32:37). As today’s First Reading tells us, this salvation will include the bodily resurrection of those who sleep in the dust. We are to watch for this day, when His enemies are finally made His footstool, as today’s Epistle envisions. We can wait in confidence knowing, as we pray in today’s Psalm, that we will one day delight at His right hand forever.
